- With the 2011 meetings, you have an opportunity to learn about research from the Canadian Society of Soil Science and interact with their membership.

• There are graduate student competitions for research presentations.

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• There are daily poster sessions that present cutting-edge research and activities, with the opportunity to talk in person with the authors of the research.

- Countless networking opportunities are available.
- You can participate in Society and divisional business meetings to understand how the Societies work.
- You get exposure to leading technologies and instrumentation at the tradeshow.
- Local tours and excursions provide the opportunity to explore topics related to activities in the agronomic, crop, and soil sciences.

The Early Career Members Committee (ECMC) has been proactive to consider your ideas and needs for the 2011 Annual Meetings. We will be offering six interactive sessions about mentoring, preparing a professional application (e.g. CV, research statement), writing and publishing manuscripts, interviewing and negotiating, and grant writing.
